## Students discuss value of time and money at 3rd Japanese-German Youth Forum in Yokohama

That was the topic that kicked off the "3rd Japanese-German Youth Forum in Yokohama" on April 14. 


## 25th Y-PORT Workshop explores Suva, Fiji's potential

On April 18, the Yokohama International Affairs Bureau Y-PORT Division presented the 25th Y-PORT Workshop on the theme of the Republic of Fiji and its capital city Suva's role as a South Pacific island hub and considerable potential.



The Overseas Environmental Cooperation Center, Japan (OEEC) shared the results of surveys conducted in February with an eye on the prospects of matching local needs with Yokohama's infrastructure technologies. Attendees also learned about the upcoming Asian Development Bank's "ADB Future Cities Workshop" set to take place in Suva this May.

A Yokohama officials presented exhibits alongside private firms from the city to showcase its policies to incorporate hydrogen energy and related technologies at the "6th China (Shanghai) International Technology Fair" held in late April.
